Each deity, with its own story and face, is a unique expression of the divine present in nature. The worship of these various deities is not a mosaic of separate cults, but rather a heavenly harmony. Each divine being brings a unique perspective and role within the vast tapestry of existence.

In every ritual, in every prayer, in every gesture of devotion, the deep connection between the deities is revealed. Each deity is a window into the deepest understanding of the cosmos, each story a reflection of eternal truth.

Each deity offers a path to the same universal truth, a path that is unique in its expression, but convergent in its destiny. The multiplicity of names and forms does not dissolve unity, but rather enriches it, showing that Divinity manifests itself in an infinite variety of shapes and colors.

CHAPTER I

THE GREAT CIRCLE OF ENERGY

Science studies natural forces and their effects on the physical world, discovering laws and principles that govern the functioning of the universe. Deities, on the other hand, are symbolic and spiritual representations of those same forces.

The energy of the Sun, the lunar cycle, the fertility of the earth and the forces of the wind are understood by science in terms of physical and chemical processes, while deities embody these concepts, offering spiritual and cultural insight into their influence.

While science explains the mechanisms of energy and its effects, deities provide a framework for understanding and respecting these forces in terms of wisdom and reverence. Thus, the Great Circle of Energy is revealed as a tapestry of eternal wisdom, where natural forces and spiritual representations intertwine in a dance of balance and harmony.

CHAPTER II

GODS, GODDESSES AND SPIRITS

It is not contradictory to believe in different creator gods and creative goddesses of different indigenous ethnic groups of this continent and other continent: because all these gods and goddesses represent the same force of nature and the same force of the entire universe that makes life possible, only represented in different forms and with different stories according to each ethnic group.

Bathala and Apolaki

Bathala is the main deity in the Tagalog indigenous group of the Philippines. This divine being is the creator of the universe and all forms of life. In its beginnings, Bathala was in solitude. Longing for company, he gave life to Amihan, the god of the eastern wind, and Aman Sinaya, the goddess of the sea.

It manifested itself through different natural phenomena such as floods, fires and earthquakes, thus establishing its authority over the world.

Apolaki is the god of the sun and patron of warriors. Brother of Mayari, he is considered the guardian of warriors and travelers, and is credited with healing and strength abilities.

Apolaki is highly revered as the Sun God, representing the daily journey he makes each morning, illuminating the sky and providing light and warmth to the Earth. Its presence is synonymous with vitality and sustenance, essential for the growth of crops and maintaining the daily rhythm of life.

In one hand, he carries a shield to protect the world from possible dangers, while in the other he holds a spear, which symbolizes his role as a god of war and also the sun's rays.

Apolaki and his sister, Mayari, the Moon Goddess, had a close but conflictual relationship. They faced off in a bitter contest for control of Earth, with Apolaki seeking exclusive control and Mayari defending equal rights.

This intense dispute led to a violent confrontation, during which Apolaki unintentionally injured Mayari in one eye, leaving her blind on that side. Aware of the damage caused and full of regret, Apolaki finally agreed to a shared rule: he would reign during the day, while Mayari would reign during the night.

Apolaki demands recognition as a formidable god of war, and his bravery and strength in combat are legendary, reflecting true courage and heroism. He is often depicted armed and vigilant, always prepared to protect his people from any threat.

Apolaki symbolizes the warrior who defends the weak, the innocent and the vulnerable. In this sense, it is totally opposed to social Darwinism and the

disastrous idea that harming the weakest or most vulnerable is a sign of power, virility or strength.

Pachamama and Amaru

Pachamama is the deity that personifies nature. The term Pacha encompasses the universe, the world, time and space, while Mama means mother. Thus, Pachamama is the mother of mountains and human beings, and is responsible for the ripening of fruits.

She supports weavers and potters in the completion of their manual work. He has a spiteful and vengeful nature. The entire natural environment is considered its temple. Pachamama acts as a protector and provider; It protects humanity, facilitates existence and promotes fertility and abundance.

It is a deity that provides benefits to crops and is considered the spirit of the Earth. Pachamama is worshiped by the indigenous communities of the Andes. She ensures the protection of crops and agricultural prosperity.

For the Quechuas, Pachamama is the source of the four fundamental cosmological principles: the earth, water, the moon and the sun.

Amaru, whose name means snake in Quechua, is the god of water, lightning, strength, continuity, the Milky Way and totality. As a rainbow divinity, he acts as an intermediary between the earth and the sun.

It lives in rivers and lagoons, being the spirit that animates these bodies of water. Its influence is linked to the management of water that irrigates agricultural fields, symbolizing the vitality of water and the rains essential for the existence of the Aymara people.

In this way, Amaru represents the water that flows through irrigation canals, rivers and springs, allowing seeds to become crops. It also symbolizes the rays descending from the sky, often seen as fertilizing the earth.

Amaru is the link between heaven and earth. It transits from Hanan Pacha, the Celestial World, to Kay Pacha, the intermediate world where humans live, and finally to Uku Pacha, the underground world.

Ixchel, Yum Kaax, Kukulkan and Aluxes

Ixchel is the Mayan goddess of the Moon, associated with love, pregnancy, medicine, textiles and painting. She protects women during childbirth. In his role as an elderly deity, Ixchel had a destructive character that caused natural disasters such as floods.

She received various names depending on the aspect she represented: Sak U' Ixik, which translates as Lady of the White Moon; Chak Chel, meaning Great Rainbow; Ix Chebel Yax, which corresponds to Lady of the First Brush; and Ix Chel, which can be translated as Resplendent Lady or Lady of the Rainbow. She is often depicted holding a rabbit, a symbol associated with the moon and fertility. Ixchel may appear as a young woman (crescent moon) or like an old woman (waning moon).

On his head he carries a snake, which symbolizes the earth, indicating that lxchel provides fertility to the earth. It is believed that lxchel protected pilgrims visiting his sacred island, Cozumel.

Yum Kaax, lord of the forest, is the name in the Mayan language for the god of vegetation and protector of the animals that live there.

Yum Kaax is a deity associated with plants and fauna, and his protection may also extend to corn fields. In the Yucatán region, the Mayans considered him the son of Itzamná and Ixchel, in addition to being the guardian of the jungle.

This god is a symbol of life, prosperity and abundance, and is known for his benevolent character. He is usually represented as a robust and attractive young man, holding a vessel containing three ears of corn.

Kukulkan, whose name translates as feathered serpent (from k'uk'ul, meaning feathered, and kan, meaning snake), is a creator deity and the god of rain, wind, storms, and life.

For the Quiché Mayan people in Guatemala, it is called Gucumatz. Kukulkan is recognized as one of the gods who contribute to creation and provides wisdom and intelligence to humanity.

In addition, Kukulkan has the ability to move both on water and on land, and to establish a connection with the sun. He participated in the construction of Chichén Itzá and was the creator of corn to sustain his people, who immediately associated it with knowledge and religion.

Born in the sea, Kukulkan is also linked to the planet Venus. It is related to four elements: the earth, symbolized by the ear of corn; water, represented by a fish; the air, which manifests itself in the vulture; and fire, represented by the lizard. The feathered serpent embodies life, light, wisdom, fertility and knowledge.

Aluxes are small spirits that barely reach the height of the average person's knees and appear as miniature indigenous people, traditionally dressed in Mayan-style clothing.

These spirits also have the responsibility of protecting the Mayan underground world, known as Xibalbá. To access a forest or sanctuary, it is necessary to request permission from the aluxes. They collaborate in the growth of corn, in the invocation of rain and in the night surveillance of the fields.

In the communities of the Mayan region, many people claim to have seen them or have been victims of their pranks. They are attributed with pranks such as moving objects from their place, disorienting travelers or making noises to scare them. However, they can also be benevolent to farmers who leave offerings in their territory.

The inhabitants of these regions describe these forest spirits as small creatures the size of small children. In addition, they often throw stones and drop

objects to scare those who are not welcome, such as thieves or people who damage the natural environment.

When they decide to become visible, they often take human form or manifest themselves through shadows. Farmers must offer them food and other provisions, and in return, the aluxes will tend to the crops, protecting them from thieves and ensuring they receive adequate water and nutrients.

Tupá, Jaci and Guaraci

Tupá is the supreme god of the Guaraníes, who is in charge of the creation of light and the universe. In addition, Tupá is the creator of the first human couple and controls the waters, storms and lightning.

Tupá has several aspects: Tupá Jakaira, who protects the world and its inhabitants, and Tupá Pochy, who does not tolerate evil and severely punishes those who violate the laws, using his rays to strike down the offenders. He also monitors and controls everything that happens on Earth and its inhabitants, as well as the sending of people's souls.

He is known by various titles, such as Our Father, Our Great Father, and Our First Father. Tupá is a manifestation of Nhamandú, the supreme god of the universe, who in the Tagalog communities of the Philippines is known as Bathala.

The creator god has different names depending on the indigenous ethnic group: Sibu among the Bribris and Cabecares of Costa Rica, Omama among the Yanomami of Brazil and Venezuela, Tocu among the Maleku of Costa Rica, Nhamandú among the Guaraníes of Brazil, Argentina, Paraguay and Bolivia, and Great Spirit in some indigenous ethnic groups in the United States.

They all represent the same creator of everything that exists, manifested in different ways depending on ethnicity and present in all the forces of nature through different gods, goddesses and spirits.

Nhamandú creates itself following a process similar to that of a plant. First, it settles on its roots (the divine soles of its feet), spreads its branches (flowering arms), forms its crown (headband of flowers and feathers) and stands like a tree. Then, his heart begins to shine.

Then, create the other gods. Together, they form the Earth, the sea, day and night, the first animals and the first plants. Finally, it gives rise to the human being.

Jaci, the daughter of Tupá, is the goddess of the moon and the guardian of the night. She is the protector of plants, lovers and reproduction. One day, Guaraci, the god of the sun, grew tired of his eternal task and felt the need to rest. As he closed his eyes, the world fell into darkness.

To illuminate that void while Guaraci slept, Tupã created Jaci, the moon. She was so beautiful that, upon waking up and seeing her light, Guaraci fell in love with her. Delighted, he decided to go back to sleep so he could admire her

again. However, when the sun opened its eyes to look at the moon, the light spread throughout the world and Jaci withdrew, fulfilling her function.

Jaci symbolizes the mother of all living beings. It can also be interpreted as an emblem of clarity and serenity, reflecting the characteristics associated with the moon.

Guaraci is the god of the sun and protector of the day, who assisted his father Tupá in the creation of all living beings. Guaraci is the god of heat and light.

The Sun, in this context, is understood as the giver of life and the creator of all forms of life, playing a crucial role in biological processes.

Laka and Lono

Laka is the goddess of hula dance and fertility, personifying the spirit of dance that celebrates life, rhythm and natural beauty. She infuses the spiritual light of the sun; both daylight and nature are under its protection. Laka is responsible for the growth and flowering of plants.

Associated with fertility and forests, its mystical and natural meaning underlines the relevance of nature and tradition in Hawaiian culture. Laka is known as the goddess of the growth of forests and vegetation, as well as the creator of the hula dance. Sometimes, she is also referred to as the goddess of love.

Laka is linked with forests and vegetation, and its association with the Lama tree is significant. The rain connects her to her husband, Lono, the god of fertility who descended to earth through a rainbow.

Lono is the god of fertility and music, who descended to Earth through a rainbow to marry Laka. It is associated with rain and food products.

He is the god of all positive aspects: rains, the sea, crops and productivity. Lono is considered the god of the sky. He brings rain and bestows fertility, and is sometimes known as Lono-makua, which translates to Lono the Provider.

Mayari and Lakapati

Mayari, daughter of Bathala, the supreme god, and sister of Apolaki, the god of the sun and war. Mayari is the goddess of the moon and night. She embodies beauty and strength.

As the goddess of revolutions and equality, Mayari manifests as a beautiful young maiden. Additionally, it is linked to healing, and is believed to provide protection to women both in their homes and during their travels.

Lakapati is a hermaphroditic deity who protects cultivated fields and ensures adequate supply of water for irrigation. He is a central figure in fertility and is considered guardian of cultivated lands and the homeless.

As an androgynous deity, Lakapati symbolizes inclusivity and diversity. He is known for his generosity and affection towards human beings. On one occasion, when humans were facing a hunger crisis, Lakapati showed them how to cultivate the land and provided them with seeds to sow.

Diwatas and Duwendes

Diwatas are nature spirits that are invoked through rituals to request prosperity, blessings and health. They live in large trees such as acacias and baletes (Ficus benjamina), and were considered guardians of nature.

The appearance of diwatas is very diverse and they can manifest themselves in multiple forms. The inhabitants of the Philippines before colonization worshiped them, as it was believed that a supreme god had created them to assist in the stewardship of nature.

The diwatas revered in the Philippines were described as superior in beauty, wisdom, and martial skills compared to humans. Rituals and offerings were made to make requests and prayers to these spirits.

Duwendes are nature spirits that live in forests and mountains. The concept of duwende originates from the ancient animistic beliefs of the indigenous people of the Philippines. These spirits were considered protectors of forests, mountains and rivers, and were believed to have influence over the destiny of people.

Duwendes are usually described as small beings, approximately half a meter tall. Some present them as kind and beneficial, while others see them as mischievous and malicious. It is believed that they can grant blessings or cast curses depending on the treatment they receive and the treatment of their natural environment.

Duwendes reside in natural areas such as forests, mountains and rivers. They are often credited with creating small homes or shelters in the roots of trees, in caves or in mounds of earth.

These entities symbolize the connection between humans and nature, underscoring the importance of maintaining balance in our environment.

Yurlunggur and Wandjinas

Yurlunggur, the rainbow serpent, shaped the world and established the rules that human beings should follow. It emerged from the earth and began to travel the surface, molding valleys, mountains and depressions with its passage.

Then, he decided to populate the earth, but to do so he first needed light. Thus, he created the sun and the moon, and also water. Vegetation emerged from this water, covering the surface of the planet, and to complete the landscape, it awakened the animals that lived in its center.

He then created the first humans, the Australian Aborigines, whom he charged with the task of protecting the earth and living in harmony with all living beings.

He instructed them to respect and care for everything from rocks and waters to animals and plants, since everything has a spirit. Furthermore, he asked them to never leave their homeland, Australia, and to pass on this sacred knowledge to future generations.

The Wandjinas are spirits of rain and clouds who left their images painted on the walls of some caves.

These beings collaborated with Yurlunggur in the formation of the sea, the land and its inhabitants. These spirits live in small pools of water. A Wandjina possesses special abilities, and if provoked, can cause flooding and severe thunderstorms.

The term Wandjina or Wondjina translates as close to water. These beings are responsible for bringing prosperity and maintaining order. They are also credited with the task of regulating the weather and the seasons.

CHAPTER III

RITUALS

Pachamama, Amaru, Tupa, Jaci, Guaraci, Ixchel, Yum Kaax, Kukulkan and the Aluxes can be offered as offerings: corn, potatoes, cassava, chicha and water.

Yurlunggur and the Wandjinas are offered water. The water offerings are left on the altar one day and the next day they are watered to the ground, they can be used to water a plant, a bush or a tree.

Bathala, Apolaki, Mayari, Lakapati, Diwatas, Duwendes, Laka and Lono can be offered as offerings: papayas, mangoes, guavas, bananas, plantains, fruit juices and water.

In the case of Pachamama and Amaru, the offerings after the ritual are buried in the ground. And in the case of the other gods and goddesses, the offerings are left on the altar one day, and the next day the offerings are left in a forest, garden or park, and the liquid ones are watered to the ground.

I perform these rituals to these indigenous gods throughout the year, and I divide the worship in this way:

- Week 1: Bathala and Apolaki, Mayari and Lakapati, Diwatas and Duwendes.
- Week 2: Bathala and Apolaki, Pachamama and Amaru, Yurlunggur and Wandjinas.
 - Week 3: Bathala and Apolaki, Guaraní deities, Laka and Lono.
 - Week 4: Bathala and Apolaki, Mayan deities, Yurlunggur and Wandjinas.

And so I divide the worship of the gods and goddesses during all the months of the year.

Ritual to Apolaki and Bathala:

Candle (optional): red.

I call on Bathala and his son Apolaki to manifest in this place, make me one with them and grant me everything I ask for in exchange for these offerings of (mention offerings).

Bathala, Creator of the universe and all that exists, you are the source of all that is good and beautiful.

Bathala, lord creator of all that exists and lord almighty, give me power of influence, luck, protection and abundance to enjoy, share and help indigenous ethnic groups, the environment and animals today, tomorrow and always.

By the power of your sacred tree, the bamboo, which stands in your honor as a symbol of strength and flexibility, I ask for your divine protection. May your wisdom guide my steps.

Bathala, lord creator of all that exists and lord almighty, provide protection to all my loved ones and provide protection to my home today, tomorrow and always.

With gratitude, I ask for your blessing of abundance and health, so that my life may flourish like bamboo in the fertile land. May your love and grace always surround me, and may I live in harmony with your divine creation.

Bathala, Lord Creator of all that exists and Almighty Lord, give power of influence, protection and abundance to all the indigenous ethnic groups of the world today, tomorrow and always.

Bathala, Lord creator of all that exists, give me inspiration to recognize your presence in all that exists, give me power to influence the world and give me wisdom today, tomorrow and always.

Thank you, Bathala, for your infinite generosity and your constant presence in my life.

Apolaki, Lord of the Sun and Lord of War, son of Bathala, before your majestic light I stand with a spirit full of respect, you are the radiant beacon that guides warriors and the defender of justice.

Apolaki, lord of the sun, give me luck, success and abundance today, tomorrow and always.

I ask you, in your infinite power and wisdom, to instill in me the courage necessary to fight against injustice. May your strength inspire me to defend what is just and true.

Apolaki, lord warrior, destroy those who harm the innocent, destroy those who harm the vulnerable and destroy those who harm the weak, today, tomorrow and always.

I ask for your divine protection for the indigenous ethnic groups, may your light protect them.

Protect me with your solar power. Extend your protective power over my home, may it be a refuge of safety.

Apolaki, warlord, may your power manifest through me, today, tomorrow and always to defeat and destroy those who deserve it.

Apolaki, lord of war, destroy those who hurt me, those who have mocked me and those who have made me suffer without repenting until now, make them suffer three times as much as I suffered.

Apolaki, warlord, destroy those who harm the indigenous people, make them suffer three times as much as the indigenous people suffered and make them feel three times the pain they caused to the indigenous people.

Apolaki, lord of war, destroy all energy of envy against me, destroy all curses against me, destroy all magic that has been done to harm me, destroy all harmful energy of ancestors and give me your protection today, tomorrow and always.

Apolaki, lord of the sun, give me power, strength, energy and vitality today, tomorrow and always.

Apolaki, lord of the sun and war, provides success, protection, luck and abundance to the indigenous ethnic groups today, tomorrow and always.

Thank you, Apolaki, for your presence and for your protection. May your light always shine on my path.

Bathala, you and I are one, your power manifests in me today, tomorrow and always, and everything I asked of you was done, so it is done and done.

Apolaki, you and I are one, your power manifests through me today, tomorrow and always, and everything I asked of you, so it was done, so it is done and done.



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Ritual to Pachamama and Amaru:

Candle (optional): green.

I call on Pachamama and Amaru to manifest in this place, make me one with you, and grant me everything I ask of you in exchange for these offerings of (mention offerings).

Pachamama, Lady of Nature and Shaper of Life, Fertile and Generous Mother, you are the source of all existence, the one who nourishes and sustains each living being with your love and your infinite abundance.

Pachamama, mother nature, source of abundance and fertility, give me luck and abundance to enjoy, share and help indigenous ethnic groups, the environment and animals today, tomorrow and always.

I ask you to guide me to protect the natural environment around us. May your love and power inspire me to care for the forests, rivers and mountains, and to maintain the sacred balance that you have created.

Pachamama, Mother Nature, grant me power of influence to help indigenous ethnic groups, to help the environment and to help animals today, tomorrow and always.

Grant me the ability to connect with all forms of life that share this world with us. May I feel the sacred connection that unites us and may I always act with respect towards the earth and its inhabitants.

Pachamama, lady of nature, source of life, lady of time and lady of space, protect me today and always, protect my home today and always, protect my family today and always, and protect the indigenous ethnic groups today and always.

I ask for your blessing of abundance, so that I may enjoy your gifts and share them generously. May my gratitude be reflected in my actions and in the care I give to your creation.

Pachamama, mother nature, mistress of time and space, destroy those who harm the indigenous ethnic groups, make them suffer three times as much as they made the indigenous people suffer and make them feel three times the pain they caused to the indigenous people.

Protect indigenous ethnic groups. May they find in your protection the strength and security they need to preserve their home.

Pachamama, mother nature, lady of the totality and force of life, always help me to value and love myself because I am your temple, and help me to value and love the trees, the plants, the forests, the jungles, the rivers and the sea because they are your temple.

Thank you, Pachamama, for your infinite generosity and your constant care.

Amaru, Lord of the Rainbow, Water, Lightning and Totality, you are the bearer of harmony between heaven and earth, the one who infuses life into the

rivers, the one who illuminates with the force of your lightning and the one who encompasses the essence of all existence.

Amaru, sacred snake, symbol of transformation, give me wisdom today, tomorrow and always.

I ask you to guide me with your wisdom and your power to protect water, the vital elixir that nourishes and gives life to all beings. May your light shine on my efforts to preserve this sacred resource, and inspire me to respect and care for the water we share.

Amaru, lord of the wind, lord of the rain, lord of the rainbow and lord of lightning, give me power, good luck and abundance to enjoy, share and help indigenous ethnic groups, the environment and animals today, tomorrow and always.

With your generosity, provide me with abundance in my life so that I can enjoy the fruits of the earth and share them with gratitude. May luck and prosperity accompany my steps and may every day be an opportunity to grow and prosper under your benevolent gaze.

Amaru, lord of the wind, lord of the rain, lord of the rainbow and lord of lightning, protect me with your wings and protect all my loved ones with your wings today, tomorrow and always.

Amaru, provide your protection over myself and my loved ones. Take care of me with your total power.

Thank you, Amaru, for your infinite kindness and your light.

Pachamama and Amaru, I am one with you and you are one with me, your power manifests through me today and always, I live in you and you live in me, and everything I asked for comes true, so it was done, That's how it's done and it's done.

I call on Ixchel, Yum Kaax, Kukulkan and the aluxes to manifest in this place today and always, to manifest through me today and always, and grant me everything I ask of you in exchange for these offerings of (mention offerings).

Ixchel, Lady of the Moon, Medicine and Love, you are the night guide that illuminates my path, the healer who provides relief and the eternal symbol of true love.

Ixchel, lady of the moon and fertility, give me good health, luck and abundance to enjoy, share and help indigenous ethnic groups, the environment and animals today, tomorrow and always.

I ask for your blessing of health, both for myself and for my loved ones. May your light give me well-being and strength, healing my body and my spirit.

With your divine love, I ask you to teach me to love myself.

Ixchel, lady of the moon and fertility, brings good health, luck, fertility and abundance to indigenous ethnic groups today, tomorrow and always.

I ask you for protection for the indigenous ethnic groups, may your power provide them with the protection and strength necessary to preserve their culture.

Thank you, Ixchel, for your light that guides me and for your love that surrounds me.

Yum Kaax, Lord of Vegetation, Guardian of the Forest and Protector of Animals, you are the custodian of the green earth and the life that flourishes on it, the one who preserves harmony between the plants and the beings that live under your shadow.

Yum Kaax, lord of vegetation and forests, give me connection with the vegetation, give me connection with the forests and give me protection today, tomorrow and always.

I ask you to guide me in protecting the forests that you have created. May your wisdom inspire me to care for vegetation with love and dedication, maintaining the sacred balance that sustains life. Help me preserve the beauty and vitality of the earth, so that the forest continues to be a refuge for all living things.

I ask for your protection for the animals, may your power protect them.

Yum Kaax, lord of vegetation and forests, give them connection with vegetation, connection with forests and protection to indigenous ethnic groups today, tomorrow and always.

I ask you, Yum Kaax, to bless me with abundance, so that I can enjoy your generous gifts, so that I can help and contribute to the well-being of our environment. May each fruit and each leaf be a reminder of your generosity, and an opportunity to share and care.

Thank you, Yum Kaax, for your constant protection and for the life you instill in the earth.

And lead me along the path of luck and abundance to enjoy, share and help.


